Today, we are stronger and continuing to grow because of YOU.

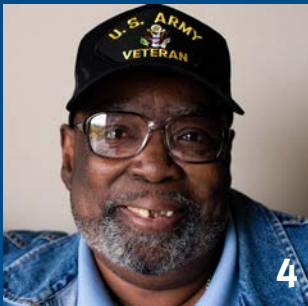
Whether you have been a supporter for years or just joined yesterday, you are changing lives and breaking the cycle of poverty.

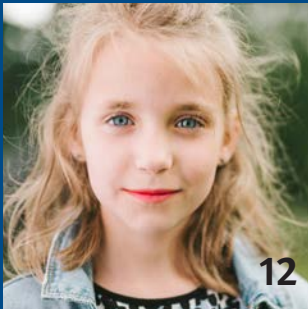

A veteran's journey home

Your support helped Nate find the home he had been searching for all along

Nate's journey to come home has been long and uphill. From 1979 until 1985, he served in the United States Army. After he left the service, Nate found work as a mail carrier, started a relationship, and welcomed the birth of his daughter.

He was working as hard as he could to support his family, but it was never enough. Every day when Nate came home from work, he was told that he wasn't enough of a man. He knew he needed to get out of that relationship, even if it meant he was left in the cold. He felt suffocated and had to leave.

For weeks Nate was sleeping in his car and living on the streets. In his time of need, a friend referred him to the Detroit Veterans Housing Program. After a few months, he found a place of his own.

Nate finally had found a place to live, but the emptiness of it was overwhelming. He was using a milk crate for a night stand and layers of blankets on the floor for a bed. As a surprise Nate, and to thank him for his service, a team of Gardner White designers and movers worked together to fill Nate's new apartment.

When Nate saw his fully furnished apartment, he couldn't contain his emotions. His bare apartment had been transformed into a home. For the first time in a long time, Nate had dignity and hope for his future. **Because of your support, Nate has the first home he can call his own.**

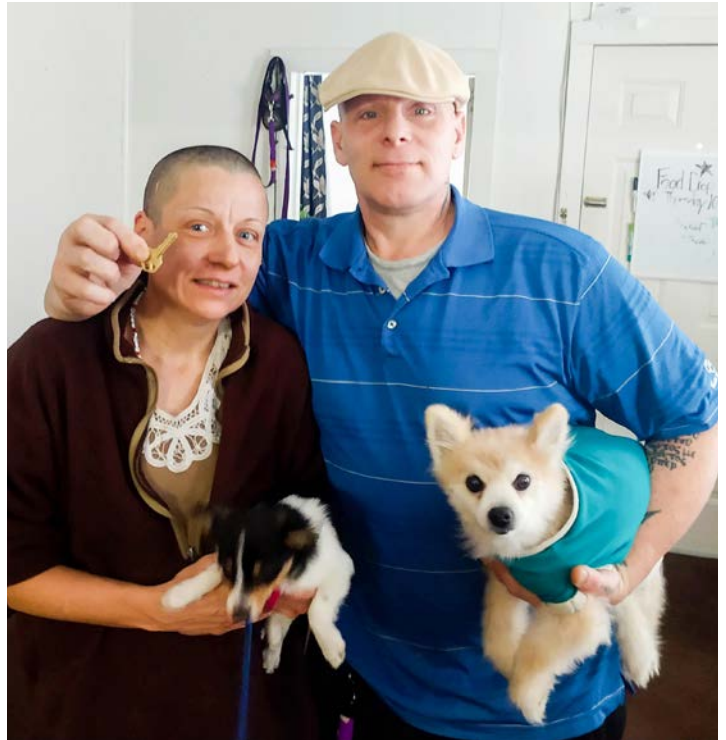

Mike's life has felt like a roller coaster ride. As a teenager, he was drafted to serve in Korea with the United States Army. When he got out of the military, Mike had so many different jobs that it was hard to keep track, and his personal life followed the same pattern.

After years of living out of state, Mike moved back to Michigan and found he had no place to stay. **Your support gave Mike safety and shelter** at the Detroit Veterans Housing Program.

Since finding DVHP, Mike has secured permanent housing at Heritage Park Senior Village, and he's been there ever since. He's finally settled, and is very active in the community. Mike sings Frank Sinatra every week at karaoke, and serves as the Sergeant at Arms on Heritage Park's Resident Committee. Most importantly, Mike is giving back to his fellow veterans by driving them to and from their appointments at the VA.



Tina, a proud Air Force veteran, served her country honorably during Operation Desert Shield and Desert Storm. After leaving the service, she settled into a home with her husband and two support dogs. Life was going according to plan, but because of circumstances beyond her control, **Tina and her family were suddenly homeless**. Tina's world was shaken to the core.

Luckily, our Supportive Services for Veteran Families Program stepped in just in time. Tina received rental assistance and within three days her family was able to move into their new home. Your support has given comfort and security back to Tina and her family when they needed it most. **"It was a blessing. When you're down, there is always someone to lift you up. Thanks for your help."**

After almost a year of being stretched to the max, she was feeling burned out. **If something didn't change, Mariela's goal of becoming a nurse would never become a reality.**

Mariela was exhausted and stressed out trying to figure out how she could pay for school knowing she needed to make more time for her family. She was in search of an opportunity that could empower her to pursue her dream and set a good example for her daughter.

That's when Mariela saw a flyer promoting a program that could help to pay her tuition. She seized the opportunity and enrolled in the program right away. Now that she doesn't have the constant worry of paying for school, Mariela is able to cut down on her hours working as a CNA and focus on being a mom, wife, and student. She is finishing her first year of nursing school and is working towards becoming an RN at a local hospital. **Mariela is thankful for the chance to create a brighter future for her family.**

Where's the camaraderie when a vet comes home?

Thanks to *you*, Brian got the support he needed

Brian welcomed the birth of his son at the young age of 15. Soon after, Brian's perspective on life shifted. He realized he needed to change his plans to take care of his family. When he graduated high school, he knew college wouldn't be an option for him as he fought to support his son with one dead-end job after the next. After years of the same cycle, he decided to follow in the footsteps of both his brothers and enlisted in the United States Army in 2007.

He was stationed all across the U.S. as a 62 Bravo (heavy machinery technician). In 2012, he was being prepped to ship out to Iraq when he was severely injured and broke his neck. Five years of service, and in an instant he was discharged and headed back to Michigan.

For years, he struggled to obtain disability support and described the past few years as a blur of trips to the VA, complicated paperwork and lots of denials. He looked to nonprofits and veteran organizations for support but no one seemed to be able to help. Brian knew the bank wouldn't care if he had served his country, they would still take his house if he couldn't pay his mortgage. He didn't know where to go or what to do and began struggling with crippling depression.

Days before foreclosure on his house, he got word that his disability was approved and he was going to be receiving support. To ensure that his family would never be at-risk of losing their home again, he took all of the disability money and paid off their mortgage. He thought the worst was behind him, but his depression wouldn't let up.

Last fall, his world came crashing down again when he lost his job. The fate of his family was weighing on him and he wasn't ready to let his wife and three children down. **His depression became so unbearable that he kept his windows shut and his curtains closed at all times. He lived in the dark, because the light of day was too much.**

Then in November, Brian found our HVRP program and began working with Heath, a military veteran and VOA staff member. For the first time in years, Brian was around someone who understood him. **Thanks to your support**, Heath was ready and able to help. Heath helped Brian revise his resume and prepare for interviews.

Brian searched for months and was finally invited to interview for a great job at GM. Brian knew the job was perfect for him. There was still a problem though... the interview was 45 minutes away... an hour and a half round-trip. Brian wasn't sure if he would have enough gas to get there and he definitely knew he wouldn't be able to get back. **Once again, you were there.** Thanks to your support, Heath was able to provide Brian with a \$25 gas card so he could focus on interview prep instead of running out of gas.

In March, Brian signed an offer to work for GM's Flint Assembly Plant as their On-Site Maintenance Technician. Brian told us, **"I knew I could get that job... I knew that I was worth that job... and I knew I could keep that job because Heath had my back."**

Brian started his new job on April 11th. He is working full-time, receiving full benefits, and is excited to join the union. **Because of your support**, Brian will have stability again. He's especially grateful to HVRP for allowing him to show his three kids that hard work and dedication truly does pay off. Brian remains thankful for VOA, for Heath, and for you!

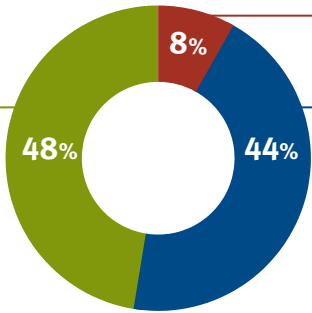

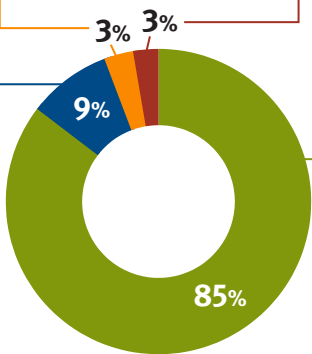
